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Country Calendar: July 2020

Harvest time crops are ripe, This is the season of delights Golden acres stretch far and wide, Barley blows like a rippling tide. JP

After months of rain we have had quite a run of dry amazing hot weather, the crops were starting to suffer from high temperatures and lack of water. Thankfully we have had a couple of days of unsettled and cooler weather which came just in time to replenish and refresh the crops. Harvest is the culmination of a year's work of neutering the crop. Recently we found vehicle wheel marks driven all over a field of barley this was caused by hare coursers. They had cut a lock and chain on the gates to gain access to the field to carry out their illicit and criminal activity of letting their dogs chase and catch the hares. Over the years we have seen an increase in numbers of hares and to us it is incredibly upsetting to know that during the night/early hours, these people have been on the farm to carry out an illegal activity and chase and catch our hares, not to mention the damage they had done to the field of barley.

Hare coursing involves poaching and trespassing, and it's aggravating and damaging to farmers — but it's very hard for us to prevent, because of the sort of men who do it. When one hare courser's home was raided recently, the police uncovered a stash of guns, ammunition and cannabis — as well as his coursing lurchers. These men come with muscle. Coursers often travel in convoy, with a car or van of 'minders' at the front and rear. Farmers who confront them get, at best, a barrage of abuse, but many have received death threats. Their barns and cars have been burnt down. Combatting hare coursing has been made a priority by rural policing strategists in recent years, to tackle the crime that breaks a host of laws, including animal welfare, criminal damage, violence, antisocial behaviour, threats to landowners and gambling. The practice involves dogs - usually greyhounds or lurchers - which are trained to chase, overtake and turn a hare that has been flushed out by a line of beaters. The highly lucrative events, which are often live-streamed, with thousands of pounds bet on the outcome, have strong links to the criminal underworld. Gangs launder money from other criminal activity through hare coursing, according to the Police's Rural Affairs Strategy 2018-2021. Hare coursing was the second most prevalent crime in the countryside

Three tips when reporting hare coursing:

- Do not approach hare coursers.
- Report any suspicious activity in the countryside to the police on 101 or Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.
- Call 999 if you suspect a crime is taking place.

The Ice Cream Parlour

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Jolyon Waterfield 24th April 1933 – 12th June 2020

Jolyon Waterfield died suddenly on 12th June at his home in Zeals. The parish is in some disbelief as we all come to terms with the sadness of his departure from us.

As you would expect, Jol's life was varied, interesting and accomplished. He loved his time in the Royal Navy, where he was a proud submariner and captained two submarines. Subsequently he became headmaster of Edge Grove preparatory school near Watford in 1985, where he remained until his retirement in 1997



He and his wife Sally then moved to Row Farm in Zeals, where they enjoyed a very full life and made countless friends over the following years. Their house was a paradise of people and dogs and was a hub of hospitality for their many friends in Zeals and the wider parish and the wider world. Their parties were legendary and they were the very epicentre of friendship and festivity for all around them.

Everyone was greatly saddened by Sally's death in June 2016 after a period of illness, and Jol spoke movingly at her funeral about the importance of family and friends and the privilege of caring for someone who is unwell. Sally continues to be very much missed here in the parish.

Thereafter Jol continued with his active life and remained throughout an enormous contributor, both in the village and wider community, and also very much in the church community. He was involved in the activities of the Parish of Upper Stour from the beginning, serving as Churchwarden at St Martin's for almost two decades. He was on the Local Church Council of St Martin's for many years and also on the Parochial Church Council for even more years! He was a great contributor at meetings, delivering good advice and some pithy reactions from time to time He was not keen on waffle nor grandstanding! He was also Chairman of the Almshouses Trustees for many years, and a Trustee of the Friends of St Martin's He made great contributions in practical ways too, and was still mowing the grass in the churchyard the week before he died.

Always wonderful company, Jol did so much for so many people, and was a true gentleman with a kind and generous heart, a brilliant sense of humour, and a great capacity for enjoyment - all in all a most special friend. We were blessed by his years with us and he will be very dearly missed

OPPORTUNITIES FOR WORSHIP FROM JULY 2020

Churchwardens met with Rev Ben via Zoom on 10th June, when it was agreed that the aim would be to open our two largest churches (Bourton and Zeals) in the coming weeks for supervised private prayer. CWs also explored the possibility of restarting midweek morning prayer at Kilmington when restrictions allow. The CofE guidance is that private prayer in churches should always be supervised, and explicitly that churches are not open for tourists.

Before any of our churches are opened there will be detailed risk assessments in advance. Once these are completed and approved, the proposal for supervised private prayer times will start as follows:

Monday : St George's Bourton 2pm – 4pm Wednesday : St Martin's Zeals 2pm – 4pm

These prayer times will not come into effect until we are comfortable that the suggestion is safe. The amount of supervision and the amount of time allowed is up for continual consideration.

St Peter's Stourton and St Mary's Kilmington will remain closed for the present, with the possibility of mid week Morning Prayer at St Mary's recommencing in due course, as mentioned above.

Reopening for Community Worship

Reopening for church services appears to be some way off, however, and after much discussion churchwardens agreed the principle of focusing on our larger churches (Bourton and Zeals) to enable greater social distancing and to share in the cleaning of these spaces.

Ben has reiterated that this guidance is permissive rather than prescriptive, and therefore many churches have chosen not to open yet. However he feels that in order to explore the new normal we wish to give people a chance begin to worship as a parish again and to have our churches back, even if in a small and very different way. Since the guidance from the CofE and from the Diocese is constantly changing, everyone is asked please not to hesitate to contact Ben if there are any queries or concerns.

Green Fingers: Notes from a Fair Weather Gardener July and August 2020

At this time of year we might all be thinking about taking a summer break, but this is definitely not the case with bugs in the garden. Our changeable British weather provides the perfect environment for a whole host of pests and diseases just waiting to attack our prized plants and produce. My garden seems to have been a magnet for aphids this year, with few ladybirds around to provide a natural defence. I have also had an influx of lily beetles. These are beautiful to look at with their bright red patent leather wings, but they can eat their way through lily plants, and in our case crown imperials, very quickly. And these are just the bugs I know about! Apparently, I should also be on the watch for capsid bugs on the fuchsias, phlox eelworm, woolly aphids and pear blister mites - but would I recognise them? This is without the complication of assorted types of rust and mould which can attack almost anything regardless of rain or shine. It's a relief to know that the green shield bugs that appear all over the garden are harmless to plants.

If the thought of all those bugs and diseases hasn't completely put you off gardening, July is a good time to plant autumn crocuses. They require very little attention and over time will naturalise in a dry sunny spot. You might also want to take cuttings of some of your favourite patio and container plants for next year.

Are you thinking about Christmas yet? Probably not, but August is a good time to plant indoor bulbs such as hyacinths and paperwhite daffodils to bloom in time for Christmas. They can be started off now in pots and left in a dark cool room or even a shed. Remember to water them and bring them indoors to a cool room when they have about 2.5cm or 1" growth. They should be bursting into bloom in time to enhance your Christmas decorations.

News from Parish Councils

Bourton

As always, despite the lockdown, it has been very busy for Bourton Parish Council. We continue to hold very successful virtual meetings with all councillors being willing and able to attend. In May we held our Annual Parish Meeting; the Annual Meeting and also the Regular Meeting. Councillor Andrew Cattaway was unanimously re-elected as our Chairman, as was Councillor Peter Williams as our Vice-Chairman. It was a busy but constructive evening of meetings reviewing financial matters; documents and risk assessments. One of the latter was the Cemetery Inspections, which I undertook alongside Councillor Ian Cooper. This was carried out with care and respect, with the difficult but necessary choice of having to lay down some of the larger headstones for safety reasons. I now have the task of recording those gravestones and, where possible, informing the relatives. If anyone does have any questions or concerns regarding this issue, please do contact me.

Also during the meetings, a Compensation Basin Working Group (at Bourton Mill) was formed, with Louise Shepherd agreeing to be the Chairwoman, ably supported by Keith Hallett and Martyn Westwell. This group will provide the PC with regular updates at future meetings. Bernie Sullivan of the Bourton Wildlife and Footpath Group reported that members of the group were in receipt of a variety of trees all looking for homes within the parish. Bernie and Susie have also been very busy clearing many of the public rights of way in the parish, making those footpaths much easier to navigate.

Kilmington

As the residents of Kilmington will probably already be aware, the defibrillator unit in the village has been out of order for quite a few weeks. It is now ten years old and would cost a disproportionate amount of money to repair. I am pleased to confirm the PC has agreed that a replacement unit can be purchased from Community Heartbeat on their "managed solutions package" which will allow a phased payment option with £575 payable now and the balance due in a year's time to allow for some fund raising. This has been possible with the help and efforts of Ian Cameron who is our volunteer co-ordinator for the unit and this is very much appreciated by the Parish Council. We are also grateful to the owner of Thenford, Mr Rupert Lund, who has agreed that the unit can continue to be housed on his front garden wall with the electric supply coming from his property. The Amenity Fund has kindly offered to donate £300 towards the new unit. A virtual Parish Council meeting was held on 2 June using the Zoom internet

conferencing platform and we were all very pleased at how well it worked out.

In line with government legislation and many other councils we will not be re-electing our officers this year and all committee members will remain in their positions until May 2021.

Zeals

As lockdown measures appear to be easing, the next public meeting of the Parish Council could be going ahead as per the normal schedule on the evening of Tuesday 21 of July in the Village Hall at 7pm. Should there have to be another cancellation, then details will be posted on our notice boards in good time. The princial item on the agenda is the checking of the Annual Governance and Accountability Review, before the completed document is despatched to the Government appointed auditors.

Councillors over the past few weeks have given their support to two planning applications: a conversion of an agricultural building at Lower Zeals Farm was fully supported, whilst a development within the grounds of Fountain Cottage was also supported but with certain, important conditions attached.

Now that the Parish Council is responsible for the facility, much work has been carried out at the playground recently. Its annual inspection did reveal that some more minor repairs were needed mainly due to normal wear and tear, and they have subsequently been completed. Some minor fixing of the chain-linking fencing was done. In addition, all of the play equipment has been given a coat of paint and the whole site is looking much more presentable.

On other matters, a replacement seat by the New Rectory on Portnells Lane is now in place. All of the allotments are occupied now (and they are all being very well looked after and are extremely productive), and a waiting list has been set up for next year. Please contact me if you are interested.

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Proposed refurbishment of Bourton Village Hall

Covid 19 has thrown up important issues for the Hall. It makes the economics of running a hall more uncertain. Will we want to use a Hall in which to meet as we used to? Will a more costly new hall be able to wash its face financially and, in any case, will funds and grants be available to build and equip one?

The Hall trustees have been advised that it will be extremely difficult to attract the funds to make any new hall happen to the necessary standard. Also, affordable housing, new technology workspaces and investment in the capacity and facilities of the school may well be seen to be higher priorities for the village community.

Notwithstanding these uncertainties, the Hall team is still determined to provide a 'greener', more modern amenity for our Community. Having sought professional advice on feasibility, costs and timings we now believe that the present hall with a secure long-term lease, suitably refurbished and with its predictable and low cost-base, is now our preferred way forward. The proposition is for a phased approach:

Phase 1

- We fix any serious threat of slippage of the bankside, underpin the meeting room and improve the way into the Hall from the car park as the new main entrance
- We create a second internal skin for the hall and create a lower ceiling to improve dramatically insulation for year-round use and re-decorate throughout
- We install efficient, flexible heating and air conditioning, lighting and electrics, possibly including a PV solar array on the south facing flat roof.
- We upgrade the loos with a new accessible toilet and an additional Ladies cubicle
- We modernise and re-equip the kitchen

Phase 2

- We install wi-fi, digital projector and new lighting/sound systems
- We buy a flexible/space-saving stage extension system

Phase 3

- We create a low-cost workspace instead of the shipping container
- We clear and resurface the car park

Now is the ideal time for action. It is likely we can get the funds for Phase 1 from the money already raised and the levy on the Mill site development. Phase 2 can come from further fundraising and perhaps some targeted grants. Community effort, know-how and resources can contribute directly to decorating and undertaking Phase 3.
