Message from Rev Ben

One more step along the world we go!

A hymn that one often hears at weddings, largely because many people learn it at school - "One more step along the world I go". It's a school song which reminds us about the ever-changing phases of life. The chorus goes like this "One more step along the world I go; one more step along the world I go, from the old things to the new, keep me traveling along with you." And the verses below gently remind us about; the many twists and turns that life can take; the good and the bad that life can present to us; the want to leap and sing in all that we do: and the tremendous amount of history that goes before us. As a Parish which has four wonderfully old church buildings, while being a challenge to preserve for the future, they do present us with a humbling reminder of our own place within history which is vitally important. From newest to oldest, Zeals Church was consecrated in 1846, Bourton Church in 1813, parts of Kilmington Church date back to 1338 and parts of Stourton Church date back to 1291. I need not say how much history has passed since 1291! Older than the Church of England indeed! Putting ourselves within such a history reminds us very clearly that while we are in uncertain times, being a part of history means that we live through nothing new, and that our challenge is always to ensure that our part in such a history is honest, loving and compassionate. However of course, as I said last month, we must continue to be kind to ourselves in order that we may be kind to others. And so, as we look to continuing times of uncertainty and change, let us take each step as it comes in the knowledge that with each step we strive to walk a path of faith, hope and love. We must continue to try and remember that while things may feel uncertain, we are walking a path that is a part of a much longer story, and that we never walk unaccompanied.

As October arrives, we are looking forward to welcoming those visitors who are all hoping to see Stourhead at one of the most beautiful times of year. Visitors hope to capture the garden at that one magical point where nature comes together to offer a calm sunny day that allows for reflections to be seen on the lake as well as a full spectrum of autumn shades from buttery yellows to vivid reds.

We are still asking visitors to pre-book their visit, with tickets being released on Fridays, to ensure that we can offer a safe and socially distanced environment for all. That said we are also exploring ways that we can enable a more spontaneous visit for those that want it, so do keep an eye out on our website, both for booking your tickets and updates on how to visit.

We're also pleased to be re-opening the house from 1 October but will be opening in a slightly different way than before. Once visitors have arrived at Stourhead, if they would like to visit the house, we will be asking them to book a timed ticket slot. We won't be offering these in advance, and pre-booked tickets to the property don't ensure admission to the house as we will be opening it at limited capacity.

As well as autumn, we are also looking forward to Christmas, both in terms of opening the house beautifully decorated, as well as our evening Christmas at Stourhead illuminated trail. If you want to come along and experience this festive trail, we recommend booking your tickets in advance, and keep an eye on our website for more information about a daytime visit this festive season.

Whatever this autumn brings, we hope that you are able to get outdoors and enjoy the beauty of the nature that surrounds you. A simple walk surrounded by the beauty of autumn, followed by a warming cup of tea (and slice of cake), is one of life simple pleasures, to be enjoyed by all.

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

Country Calendar: October 2020

Rusty orange red yellow and brown Adorn the landscape like a regal crown Earthy smells pervade the senses Birds glean berries from sparse damp hedges. JP

After the most prolonged stressful harvest, snatch and grab being the name of the game, for a few farmers salvage would be the correct terminology. The wind/heavy showers knocked heads off the barley; a friend of ours lost a whole field of oats due to high winds blowing the oat grain onto the ground, leaving nothing left to harvest - a whole year's work gone. There is nothing more soul destroying and depressing seeing the rain and winds flatten and damage your crop.

On a lighter note watching "Our Family Farm" (the Owen Family with their 9 children in the wilds of Yorkshire) has been happily diverting. The children are hardy and definitely free range, in fact it reminds me of my own childhood somewhat. My father kept pigs and showed them quite successfully winning prodigious shows with his pedigree large white boars. As a child my brothers and I spent many hours with Father helping and learning everything about rearing pigs. As children we had our favourites: the show ones were well handled and reasonably quiet. We challenged each other to see who could ride a pig and stay on the longest. Pigs are incredibly agile, and we spent much time trying to get on them and seconds to fall off them. Never deterred we kept at it and literally fell about laughing. Gladstone was our father's highly prized boar, Supreme Champion at the York Pedigree Show, and because of this he was in high demand and Gladstone was taken to fellow pig breeders to do the business! One memorable day Father asked my eldest brother and me to walk Gladstone round to the next-door neighbour who required his talents. Gladstone would follow a bucket of food to the ends of the earth. Taking the boar literally just half a mile down a very quiet country lane did not phase us - bearing in mind my brother was a 9 year old bossy irritant and I was just coming up 7. Father had great confidence in our handling skills I still remember him standing there watching with great pride as we both set off. Beautifully turned out (both boar and me - I was in a pretty party dress after being at a birthday tea and Gladstone show-clean and a credit to Father) he trotted out following brother and bucket. My job was to poke him with a stick if he dallied too much. All was going very well, Gladstone was in hot pursuit of the food and I was running on behind trying to keep up. Never under-estimate a pig: they are highly intelligent.

Gladstone soon realised that chasing a bucket when there was delicious watercress in the shallow stream at the side of the road which was much more tempting was pointless, and within a blink of an eye he was totally submerged in slimy mud and watercress. My brother was blaming me totally for not stopping Gladstone (typical brotherly love - NOT) So I whacked him with the stick – the

pig that is, should have been brother. "Harder -- don't tickle him with it" was my brother's unhelpful order.. It took every ounce of my strength, and I meant business as I was so annoyed with my brother, and, just as I was about to bring the stick down on Gladstone's backside, I slipped and fell in the ditch on top of the boar, the shock of which made him lurch forward taking off at speed heading totally in the wrong direction. I was left in ditch covered in slimy smelly mud and my white patent leather shoes full of filthy water. I did not cry, even though my brother stood over me laughing saying I deserved to be in the muck as I was totally useless! I climbed out and walked back expecting trial and retribution as brother would make sure I took the blame. My poor father's face at the sight of me was something - but right was done and my brother got a clip round the ear for leaving me in such a mess. The boar was found happily grazing further up the road. Happy days!!

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News from Parish Councils

Bourton

Since April we have continued holding the PC meetings virtually via Zoom and, in accordance with the regularly revised guidelines from NALC, we will continue to do so. At the July meeting the new prospective scheme for the Sandways site was discussed and, since then, the developer Aaron Pierce (Director, T&A Land) and the PC's planning sub-group have arranged to conduct a public consultation and community engagement morning in the Village Hall on Saturday 3rd October from 10am until 1pm. This event is to inform the community and assess the level of support so please do try and pop in. The VH will be adhering to all the necessary Covid-19 precautions.

There have again been several reports of near-miss incidents at the junction of Brickyard Lane and West Bourton Road. Inconsiderate parking on West Bourton Road contributes to these incidents, along with people driving too fast from the Main Road and using the hatchings. Cars parked by the War Memorial also make it very difficult for the school bus to be able to safely pick up school children. Please be considerate if you do need to park on this road. Green Fingers: Notes from a Fair Weather GardenerOctober 2020

We are now well into Keats' season of mists and mellow fruitfulness and you may still be harvesting apples and pears. It is also time for the birds to set about harvesting all the beautiful berries on your cotoneasters and rowan trees.

Traditionally, gardeners were advised to put the garden to bed for winter, but the modern trend is to leave plants to die down naturally rather than rushing to cut them down to the ground. There are of course some plants that look so straggly that there isn't much point in leaving them to spoil the view, but others can provide months of pleasure over the winter. Sunflower heads are magnets for the birds as they forage for seeds, as are red hot pokers and monardas. It is a pleasure to watch the goldfinches as they enjoy the seeds which in the past might have gone onto the bonfire. Another benefit of leaving plants to die down is that they might self-seed, providing a springtime surprise next year. I love the rather random effect this can produce as my garden is very informal.

Wallflowers seem to be experiencing something of a revival in popularity, and now is a good time to plant them ready to bloom in the spring. They are available in such a wide range of colours now, not just the traditional red and yellow, but anything from whites through to lilacs and hot pinks. They complement tulips perfectly and last well as cut flowers.

October can be gloriously warm and sunny to set us up for the colder months ahead, or it can bring some early frosts. Although there will still be autumn squashes and winter cabbages to harvest, some vegetables will not tolerate the colder weather. If you have been growing tomatoes outside, this will be the last month you are likely to get any ripe fruit. You can dig up the whole plant and hang it upside down in a greenhouse to encourage the last fruits to ripen. Alternatively, you could try the old fashioned trick of putting the remaining green tomatoes into a brown paper bag with one ripe tomato to do the same job. Or you could just give up the unequal struggle and make green tomato chutney great with fresh bread and a piece of strong cheddar!
