Message from Rev Ben

During November, we remember. Whether it be remembering 5th Nov as a part of our cultural history, those who paid the ultimate price in conflicts since 1914 on Armistice Day, or remembering the life of a loved one at the All Souls service - November is a time when we have the opportunity to look back and reflect. At this time of year, the nights draw in, the heating goes on, and we so often look inwards to what is on our hearts. This year we have already been guite used to sitting in our burrow with time to reflect. However, during November the church often takes up the opportunity by spending some time in introspection before Advent. We provide the opportunity to remember a loved one at All Souls, we consider the glorious company of Saints who go before us and we remember those who have fallen in battle. However, toward the end of November the church answers its introspection, its collective looking back over the weeks, years and centuries, by affirming the ultimate care, compassion and benevolence of God who holds us in love. Malcolm Guite's Sonnet 'Christ the King', reminds the reader of the rootedness believing in a God who was for a time, human. While November can be a difficult month as we get used to the darker nights with more time to reflect, Guite reminds us that while sometimes we may go from day to day with heavy hearts, the feast of Christ the King doesn't say. "It will all be okay in the end because God knows what's going on even if I don't", and rather that in our times of both sorrow and joy, God is with us. Green Fingers: Notes from a Fair Weather Gardener November 2020

Traditionally, November is seen as the beginning of winter, when the last glories of summer and autumn have gone and there is only the gloom of winter to come. As a child, I remember it as a time of great excitement, when I would help to gather up the fallen leaves to put on the bonfire on November 5th. My father always seemed to have some old clothes that could be stuffed with leaves to make a guy. As gardeners, we should be collecting the leaves now too as they can harbour unwelcome slugs and snails if left on the flower beds. If collected up and stored for a couple of years in nets or bin bags with holes, they will magically turn into leaf mould to be used for mulching. Now is the time to scatter this around your plants as it will be especially helpful in breaking down the heavy clay soil that many of us locally have in our plots.

November is a time for looking forward to spring and planting spring and even summer bulbs. You can plant lily bulbs in pots now for the summer, and best of all, you can plant tulips. There really is a tulip to suit every taste and situation in the garden. From the beautiful species tulips that need to be seen at close range to appreciate them, to the stately traditional tulips that bloom in April and May. You could have tulips blooming from February to May in almost every colour of the rainbow. Plant them now in pots or in the garden, but be sure to protect them from marauding squirrels. Pots can be protected with a double layer of wire mesh- not attractive but effective. In the ground, planting them deeper than recommended seems to work, or planting them close to something unpleasantly smelly like a clump of crown imperials.

Looking to spring is all very well, but it's good to enjoy what is in the garden now. There may still be some dahlias in bloom and probably some chrysanthemums and nerines if you have them. Not all the trees will have lost their leaves and fruits, so you can enjoy the vibrant colours of cotoneasters and spindle trees. But it isn't all about colour: the winter garden has a beauty of its own as the trees show their skeletal forms against an autumn sunset.

Attention Dog Walkers : Your Dog's Excrement Kills

PLEASE <u>ALWAYS</u> REMOVE ALL YOUR DOG'S POO FROM FIELDS WHERE CATTLE GRAZE Dog poo left on fields with cattle exposes cows to parasitic infection that can result in early abortions, or leave calves infected with the parasite.

Neosporosis in cattle is caused by the parasite found in the faeces of infected dogs or foxes. Abortion normally occurs between three and eight months of the pregnancy. Infection from dogs can lead to multiple abortions within the herd. **Once infected, animals remain infected for life.**

Neosporosis is the most common diagnosed cause of abortion in cattle in the UK. Any live, full-term calves they produce may be born infected. Neospora will pass from generation to generation and there is no vaccine available.

PLEASE PROTECT OUR COWS - make sure you notice where your dog defecates and pick up and remove move the faeces immediately. Thank you

Country Calendar: November 2020

Days short, skies dark Cruel wind, cold and stark Quickened breath, icy blast Winter's cloak truly cast.

Winter is upon us, and we are well into winter work mode. All the cattle are hunkered down into their routine as the wind rain and winter's chill does its worst. I always get a feel-good factor knowing that the cows and calves are dry and warm.

As beef farmers we were shocked to read in the national press that the food wholesaler Booker, which is owned by Tesco, has admitted relabelling Uruguayan beef as British – but claimed it was a case of "human error" and not common practice. This is a breach of both trading standards and environmental health law. Bookers' freezing and shelf-life policy is just as concerning. A best-before date of July 2021 from an animal slaughtered in November 2019 covers 20 months. Guidelines for good practice on frozen beef suggest it can be frozen for a period of up to six months, but certainly no more than 12 months. A statement from Bookers, in response, said a two-year shelf life on frozen beef, lamb and pork was standard practice across the retail sector for food frozen at source. The original source label for imported Uruguayan beef had been over labelled obliterating much of the original information, which included best-before dates.

Well, does any of this surprise us? The British beef industry produces beef on the highest environmental welfare and ethical standards; we are desperately concerned as an industry that pro Brexit trade deals could allow imports of food produced in ways that would be illegal in the UK undercutting British farmers and lowering standards. Now the whistle is blown on such well-known retailers who are taking advantage of weak government's rules. As it stands to date the government have re-buffed any attempts to include the protections in the Agriculture Bill going through Parliament, arguing existing laws already enshrine them, even though the NFU (National Farmers Union) argue that this is not the case, Booker/Tesco being a prime example! My daughter would tell me to make sure it has The Red Tractor Label, as this is totally traceable from farm to plate.

Breaking News: Harry Parker is the newly elected Chairman of The British Limousin Cattle Society. Harry has been involved in this breed of cattle for many years and is an active member of The South West Limousin Club. He has been the Club Representative on The British Limousin Council of Management for 8 years and has now been voted Chairman of the largest cattle breeding society. It is a huge accolade as Harry works tirelessly to promote the breed and the best of British beef. The position is for three years and will encompass the 50th Anniversary Celebrations of The British Limousin Breed.

News from Parish Councils

Bourton

With the colder weather fast approaching I will be working towards ensuring the grit bins are adequately filled and there are to be new bins installed, one at the bottom of Church Track and the other on Millers Close. I envisage this will be how we conduct our meetings for the foreseeable future, certainly well into 2021. The PC Highways Team, led by Councillor Fran Gillett and our Speedwatch Co-ordinator, Sheila Williams, are continuing to look into the issue of speeding traffic and drivers abusing the white hatchings on West Bourton Road. I am delighted to report that the Parish Council has received an excellent response to our request for donations towards the cost of the new defibrillator unit. The total cost was £1400 and the PC was able to find £575 from reserves which left a shortfall of £825. £300 was received from the Amenity Fund, £347 from parishioners and £178 via Lloyds Bank compensation payments which I successfully claimed from them for excessive hours spent on the telephone and errors on our account. We would like to thank all our donors very much indeed. More good news comes in the shape of Wiltshire Highways having done a fairly thorough patching job in Butts Lane and in Church Road.

As you may have already heard, the Playing Field Committee has unfortunately had to cancel the annual Firework Display on 5 November as it is felt that under the present restrictions it would be irresponsible to hold it.

Zeals

Thanks to our returning Parish Steward, who had been seconded along with other stewards to undertake highways work throughout the county, several of our hidden street signs that had been covered over by foliage are now exposed, and a number of overgrown verges have also been trimmed. He was also able to make the time to patch small areas of road surface along High Street. Wiltshire's contractors have carried out essential repair work on the road surface along Bells Lane following recent requests. Unfortunately, the repairs required to make safe the damaged build-out structure opposite the Hall will involve more planning and technical expertise. To his great credit again, our Parish Steward has completed another temporary repair thus making the build-out reasonably safe for the time being.

Some residents may not be aware of the very successful Seeds4Success organization that operates locally. It is a charitable venture of interest and benefit to teenagers and others that operates out of Mere, and also with branches at Wilton and Tisbury. Altogether some 65 young people are currently engaging in activities and receiving other opportunities and advice from the system's key workers. Their website will provide readers with further details.

The next public meeting of the Parish Council would normally be taking place at 7pm in the Village Hall on Tuesday 17 November. However, it is most likely that this will not take place owing to the uncertain times we are currently experiencing. Councillors shall most probably continue to deal with business matters remotely, as they have been doing since lockdown began several months ago. Councillors meet regularly as a group outside whenever there is a site meeting to discuss a planning application. The Parish Council will be laying a wreath on behalf of the village by the War Memorial on Remembrance Day. By then we should have named brass plates in situ beside each of the commemorative trees at Longcross as another reminder of those from our village who gave up their lives for our freedom.

We have received a generous donation from past parents along with a very generous donation from our school PTFA and plan to use this money to create a purpose built safe and secure Forest School area complete with fire pit, tools, seating and gardening facilities; thus improving our current facilities.
