Message from Rev Ben

This year we have already seen some glorious and some appalling days of weather! With this in mind, the middle of July marks the feast of St Swithun on 15th July, who is of course famed for the telling of fair or foul weather, depending on the state of play on 15th July.

St. Swithin's day if thou dost rain
For forty days it will remain
St. Swithin's day if thou be fair
For forty days 'twill rain nae mair (no more).

St Swithun was born in my home county of Hampshire, in about 800 and died 2nd July 863 in Winchester. He was Bishop of Winchester between 852-863 and is venerated for his kind, clever and miraculous deeds. Among these was the building of a stone bridge over the river Itchen at the eastern gate of Winchester, to help the poor enter the city to sell their wares. Legend has it that one of his miraculous acts occurred when an elderly woman crossed the bridge, coming into the city to sell eggs. She tripped and dropped her basket of eggs, breaking them all. St Swithun gathered the eggs and returned them to her unbroken. Artistic depictions can be found in various places in Hampshire with the egg remaining as a symbol of St Swithun.

'But what has St Swithun got to do with rain?' I hear you ask! In keeping with his humility, St Swithun, as the Bishop of Winchester, requested to be buried outside of Old Minster where the rain could fall upon him, and where he was still with the daily hustle and bustle of the city. However, in contradiction to his wishes, his body was moved inside of the Old Minster (not his final resting place), on 15th July 971 and legend has it that on this day a heavy shower poured forth as a token of disgust from the late St Swithun.

In these uncertain times when good weather and the opportunity to meet people outside is a refreshing form of comfort, I do hope and pray that we can all find St Swithun's day as fair and bright as a foretaste of further good weather to match our homes for the future.

Green Fingers Notes from a Fairweather Gardener July & August 2021

Are you sitting back in your favourite garden spot reading this? After all the odd weather patterns we have experienced over the past few months, your garden is now probably a riot of colour and possibly also fruitfulness as all the plants try to make up for lost time.

As you sit and gaze on the results of your handiwork, you should dig out some of your most useful garden tools. No, not the backbreaking sort, but the ones you keep, or should keep, in your pocket at all times when you wander round the garden. I mean a camera and a notebook. You don't need to be a prize winning photographer to make a record of your garden throughout the year. It is easy to think that you will remember that wonderful plant combination that haphazardly appeared and you want to repeat next year, but unless you truly do have a photographic memory, it might fade into oblivion in a month or so.

Use your camera, your phone, or perhaps a sketchbook if you are artistically inclined, to record anything you want to remember, good or bad. Use the notebook to remind you which plants need to be split in the autumn and which need to be moved, either because they are unhappy where they are or because they don't look good in that position. You might like something you see when you visit an open garden – take a picture, make a note! Even the grandest gardens have something that can be adapted for our more humble patches.

As you make a record for next year, take the opportunity to dead head flowering plants to encourage new growth. Sweet peas, roses and other cutting flowers will only continue to bloom if you keep picking them. The seeds from some perennials can be scattered now to provide a naturalistic look next year, and you can leave some annuals to self-seed as well. If they pop up where you don't want them next year, they will probably be quite easy to move. Don't be too rigorous with this though — some seed heads provide excellent food for the birds. Although they can look a bit ragged, the seeds of red hot pokers are a favourite with goldfinches, and what a delight it is to see them in the garden.

Country Calendar: July/August 2021

The weather always dominates: it dictates and impacts on everything we do. After the dry cold spring everything is much later, and we are busy with silaging and harvest is not too long away. The cattle are out which eases the workload somewhat, so now we are hoping for a good dry settled spell -- unlike a memorable day in May when the heavens opened and hailstones fell like mini golf balls: unbelievable! Being irritatingly confined to barracks I had time for a coffee and a quick browse through the newspaper - a luxury in itself.

My exasperation upon reading an article on the proposed Australian trade deal of beef to the UK instantly made me put to pen a letter to *The Times*. This was my first ever attempt, and, regardless of whether or not they printed it, it was extremely therapeutic. The next day I received an e-mail back that it would be in the Friday edition. So here it is (see next page) in print, and the funniest thing was when my daughter rang and said "Mum you have gone viral", as apparently it was on Twitter, Instagram, Facebook, and a Farmers Forum of people sharing it all around the world. Within hours I had 15,000 likes on Instagram alone, with lots of positive and supporting comments, even from an MP (opposition party of course).

I am afraid I do not do social media but my children were rather impressed - my five minutes of fame you could say, except it is a very serious matter. The UK will agree to a zero-tariff, zero quota access for Australian agricultural exports. In return Australia will remove tariffs on products such as Scotch Whisky and Climate change and carbon footprint affects all our lives, so surely producing our own food should be of the highest priority. It is very obvious that UK farmers are being used as a pawn; we are expendable, a price the Government is prepared to pay for membership of the Trans-Pacific Partnership which requires Australia's support and is seen as key to getting the agreement! "It is politics" one friend told me: regardless of all our legitimate concerns we are a minority industry, and we simply do not have enough clout! Well, rewilding is the answer to climate change according to a programme on Radio 4. Plant more trees - fabulous for eating up the carbon emissions; and introduce beavers to create wetlands - brilliant except beavers eat trees and in Scotland the beaver is creating problems as a result of escaping and multiplying at a surprising rate. Like the badger no predator. Oh, I have the answer - wolves!

Harry leaves a daughter, Jo, who organised a multi faceted funeral service at St George's on 28th June as a tribute to Harry. He was a devoted father and grandfather, and friend to many, and he will be much missed.



News from Parish Councils

Bourton

After 14 months of virtual meetings Bourton Parish Council finally met face to face in the village hall for the three meetings – the Annual Parish meeting, the Annual General meeting and the usual monthly Parish meeting. All three meetings went very well and our Chairman, Andrew Cattaway, managed all three of them superbly. There were 8 members of the public in attendance and all the necessary COVID safe measures were carefully adhered to by all.

During the AGM a unanimous vote by all councillors in attendance agreed that our existing Chairman and our Vice Chairman, Peter Williams, continue in their roles which is good news for the PC and the community. All other councillors present volunteered for the following roles: Peter Williams, Andrew Sturt, Kevan Barton and Paul Curry – Planning Sub Group; Fran Gillet – Highways and Transport Officer; Kevan Barton – Footpaths Liaison Officer; Andrew Cattaway and Andrew Sturt - North Area DAPTC Representatives; Peter Williams – Bourton and Silton Charity Representative; Andrew Sturt – Safeguarding Officer; and Sheila Williams – Community Safety.

We have had two councillor resignations – Roger Moores submitted his to the Chairman on 11th May and Ian Cooper on 20th May. The Notice of Vacancy was duly advertised and the electorate had 14 days to call for an election. However, no election was called which meant that candidates could put themselves forward with further details published in the noticeboards, website, and the village Facebook group.

Please remember that all the minutes can be viewed on the Bourton Village website, the village Facebook page and also both noticeboards.

Kilmington

At the Annual Parish Council meeting on 20 May, the annual accounts were approved and signed off. As has been the case for the past few years, it was agreed to certify the council exempt from External Audit and this will save a fee of £200. All of the paperwork in connection with the accounts is on our website and on the village noticeboard, including information on public rights to inspect the accounting records between 14 June and 23 July which is a legal requirement.

Since our last meeting, the council has considered another planning application (PL/2021/04683) in relation to the change of use from agricultural to holiday let to include five proposed glamping pods and a service pod, on the field to the west of the B3092 between Norton Ferris and a private residence, Ferngo. The Council agreed (on vote of 5 for, 1 against and 1 abstention) to **Support subject to the condition** that the glamping pods are used solely as holiday

accommodation. In addition, the council has concerns about the highways access and support is conditional upon the Wiltshire Council highways engineers being satisfied that any access to and from the entrance is safe. Our next meeting will take place on Monday 6 September at the Home Guard Club commencing at 7.30 pm.


